What's your first line of defense? ALWAYS LOCK YOUR CAR DOORS!

In the Franconia District, officers take reports daily from people who have not locked their car doors and find someone has been in their car, something missing from their car or their car missing all together. Locking your car doors is your first line of defense.

How do you protect your valuables?

TAKE THEM OUT OF YOUR VEHICLE!

The reason people steal personal belongings from your car is because they see something they want. Remember, what is not valuable to you may be the object of their desire.

Please, take the extra time to physically remove your CD player, BlueTooth, laptop, GPS, CDs, purse, radio, etc. from your vehicle. Remove any

empty bags or briefcases to relieve the criminals' curiosities. Clean the GPS suction cup circle off of your windshield.

The library's grand reopening ceremony took place on July 22 at 6 pm. The children of the Bravo Theatre Project from St. Mark's Church sang a medley of patriotic songs. Springfield Boy Scout Troop 881 did the flag ceremony. The ribbon-cutting took place after remarks by Board of Supervisors Chair Sharon Bulova, Supervisor Jeff McKay, and Library Director Sam Clay. The architectural firm Berry-Rio presented the library with two new books on architecture to be added to its collection. Berry-Rio architects designed the renovation.

In addition to storytimes for preschoolers, we will offer an English conversation group for those who wish to practice their English and a monthly nature program for ages 6-12 presented by the Hidden Pond Nature Center. The Springfield Writers Group and the Travel Club will continue to meet at the library. We also hope to resume our popular one-on-one computer tutoring later this fall.

The Friends of the Richard Byrd Library began their ongoing book sale on August 10. Prices are very reasonable and the proceeds are used to support the library in many ways.

TRANSPORTATION

Potholes. Tall grass. Traffic. Unpainted lane markings and pedestrian crossings. Roadside trash. Traffic calming. My staff and I are peppered with complaints at meetings and in phone calls and emails. We are a conduit for funneling these complaints to the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) but we have neither the authority nor the funding to resolve them.

Since the Depression year of 1932, the state has been responsible for road construction and maintenance. (Only two counties—Henrico and Arlington—opted to keep that responsibility at the time that the state secondary road system was established. Virginia cities, however, are responsible for road construction and maintenance.)

For some time, the General Assembly has dealt with Virginia's fiscal issues by steadily cutting funding to VDOT. Despite our local state leaders' efforts to fund transportation, the statewide General Assembly has cut road construction funds to almost nothing and maintenance funding is now at a crisis point. As a matter of fact, VDOT released a press release encouraging volunteer mowing after its annual mowing budget was slashed in half. The headline might as well have been *You Want it Done, Do it Yourself*.

We got a good look at how bad the situation is last week at the Board of Supervisors' public hearing on the *Proposed Virginia Department of Transportation Six-Year Secondary System Construction for Fiscal Years 2011 through 2016*. The amount allocated to Fairfax County roads is \$1,989. That's less than two thousand dollars for six years to cover 395 square miles and more than a million people. In 2003, the *Six-Year Program* allocated \$138 million to Fairfax County; in 2004 it was \$153 million. But by 2005, we saw a steep downward trend.

Where do we go from here?

Some have asked if Fairfax County could do a better job of maintaining roads and managing traffic than VDOT. At the same time, the state appears eager to hand off or devolve its road responsibility to local governments. Without adequate funding transferred to localities, we'd be left holding the bag with nowhere to go but to the taxpayers. That is completely unacceptable to me. Since the devolution train seems to be moving down the track, the Board's Transportation Committee (that I chair) is studying this issue. We're looking at what options we might take on if the state lives up to its responsibilities and provides adequate funding.

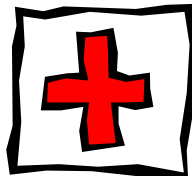
